

Third Sunday of Lent

"But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!" Who wants to repent? Who wants to change habits, make sacrifices, or chart a more challenging course? Repentance isn't the easy road. Few of us are naturally drawn towards it. Perhaps that's why Jesus had to speak with such boldness in today's Gospel. Repent, or perish. Change, or suffer and die. Not what we like to hear. Not what we like to do. But we would be foolish

The entire Gospel message is certainly one of mercy and compassion. Jesus was the first to show forgiveness to sinners, and he always called others to do the same. He suffered and died



so that WE wouldn't have to suffer eternal death. But the fact remains that we can still CHOOSE to "perish." We can choose to stay rooted in our favorite sins and to cling tightly to the comfortable vices that stifle a virtuous life. When we won't let go of them, then we don't truly repent. But Jesus urges

us to change so that we can enjoy the eternal benefits of his mercv. He doesn't want us to perish! As we hear in today's psalm, "He redeems your life from destruction, crowns you with kindness and compassion." Repenting--turning back to God--puts us in the right position for this spiritual coronation.

Lent is a time especially built for repentance. It is a season that calls us not only to recognize where we need to change, but to actually set those changes into motion. Lent isn't just a pious liturgical ritual. These forty days are a response to Christ's stern warning that we need to repent in order to save our souls. Let's not pretend to be exempt from the message. Lent is meant for ALL of us.

Lent 2016: Lent offers us all a very special opportunity to grow in our relationship with God and to deepen our commitment to a way of life, rooted in our baptism. In our busy world, Lent provides us with an opportunity to reflect upon our patterns, to pray more deeply, experience sorrow for offending God in what we have done and failed to do, to seek God's mercy and forgiveness in Confession and to be generous to those in need.

Third Sunday Lent Daily Meditation:

Form a new heart within. This Sunday brings us closer to the font of renewing our baptismal commitment. It is also the first of three Scrutinies for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. We are deeply aware that there is a struggle going on in us. We turn to God, that we might not become discouraged. We rely on God's compassion and love for us. We acknowledge who we are - sinners who experience the consequences of our selfishness but we know we are loved and we desire to be filled with hope. We go into this week renewed in our desire to continue our prayer, fasting and generosity toward others.

Living Lent With Mercy-Pope Francis Third Sunday in Lent -Always Forgiving: Mercy will always be greater than any sin and no one can place limits on the love of God who is ever ready to forgive. Misericordiae Vultus N. 3

Lord, you are merciful, slow to anger and rich in compassion. My efforts to imitate you are often sad failures because I am not a very patient and understanding person. I am quick-tempered and often hurt others unintentionally. In my insecurity, I make unreasonable demands on people ad cause undue stress in their lives. It seems much easier to point out the faults and failings in others rather than to affirm their gifts and talents. Lord, help me to recognize the sin of pride in my heart. Forgive me for being an obstacle to your abounding love and mercy. Amen.

The Jubilee Year of Mercy: In response to our Bishop's request, St. Ann's has a Prayer Hour for Mercy with Eucharistic Adoration every Monday evening at 7:00 p.m. The Sacrament of Confession is available during that time until 7:55 p.m. when we will have Benediction. In addition, Confession is available before each weekday Mass from 9:00 a.m. to 9:20 a.m. Tuesday to Friday. Confessions on Saturday are available from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. in addition to the usual 4:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. It is my hope that this Year of Mercy will be a time of increased prayer and increased reception of the Sacraments, especially Confession and the Eucharist, so that we may grow much closer to Our Lord Jesus Christ and better appreciate and put into practice the great love and mercy He shows us. Also, at any time you would like to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, you may come to the rectory or phone to make an appointment.

On Saturday March 5th, 2016 in every parish church across the diocese, a priest will be available from 10am-2pm to hear individual confessions. There will also be Eucharistic Adoration during this time. We need volunteers to commit to a time in Adoration so that the four hours are covered. There is a sign up sheet at the back of the church where you may sign up for as long as you like.

Share Lent Pilgrimage—Building community in Indonesia The third week of our pilgrimage finds us in Indonesia. The word kampung has come to mean "slum" in the local language, but its original definition is "community". Your support for Share Lent means that Try Mopurto, who lives in *kampung*, has been able to renovate his home for his family, despite suffering from mental illness. The community is coming together to support him and his family. "My home is my heaven," he says, "because here we feel the meaning of brotherhood in the social life of the kampung." The Share Lent collection will take place on March 13th, Solidarity Sunday.

Syrian Refugee Sponsorship Committee & Fundraising:

A very special thank you to those who attended the first meeting this past week. Nineteen parishioners met with Fr. Chad and Deacon Jim for an information session to learn about the options available for us to proceed with the sponsorship of a Syrian Refugee Family. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, March 9th at 7pm in the church hall. Our guest will be Marilyn Nabilsi, the diocesan representative who has been assigned to assist parishes who have made a sponsorship commitment. Our financial goal is to raise \$30,000 to sponsor a family with 5-7 members. To date, a total of \$5,695 has been donated. We thank you for your tremendous support! We will continue to accept donations in the coming weeks. Please use a separate envelope labelled "Syrian Refugee Family" with your name and address on it. If donating by cheque, please make it payable to "St. Ann Parish". There are many details involved with this initiative. As time progresses, the committee will keep you informed and up to date about these decisions and other ways you may assist. Once again, we are thankful and very grateful for the interest shown in re-locating a refugee family and assisting them to acclimatize to our culture.
