



Easter Sunday

This Easter, in churches all over the world, people will be fully initiated in the Catholic Church. Those who have come from another Christian denomination have already begun their journey with Jesus Christ. But for those who are baptized at the Easter Vigil, a new reality has come to pass. Each newly baptized man, woman, and child have become new creations in Jesus Christ. They have died and risen with the one who rose on the third day and whose empty tomb we celebrate every Easter. Easter Sunday morning, they awake after many months of RCIA and all have the same question before them: "Now what?"



When one finds themselves having journeyed through various thresholds of conversion and now they bear the name of Christian, the time comes to chart the course of life as a disciple. Stewardship is that course of life. How one lives out their life from now on is the life of stewardship. The less one understands true stewardship and the value of their gifts and talents to the Body of Christ, the harder the journey.

Those of us who were baptized many years ago can easily fall into a false sense of comfort. We forget that sense of excitement those coming into the Church experience at the Easter Vigil. However, the story of that empty tomb reminds us of the power behind our baptism. Today, we, too, are called to discipleship and a stewardship way of life. Jesus continues to provide the answer to our, "Now what?"

Province Wide Lockdown Effective April 3rd, 2021

The government of Ontario announced a province wide lockdown effective Saturday, April 3rd, at 12:01 am. New measures include a newly reduced capacity for worship areas. Churches are permitted to remain open with a maximum capacity of 15% including weddings and funerals. The 15% capacity includes all involved in ministry (priest, cantor etc.) as well as staff members/volunteers who manage contact tracing and disinfecting protocols, if they remain for the church service.

Reservations will not be taken for weekday Masses or Tuesday Holy Hour. For weekend Masses, beginning April 10/11 and for the duration of the current lockdown, reservations will be required. We will be adding a 12:30pm Mass on Sunday to accommodate more parishioners.

Face coverings are mandatory.

Once the 15% capacity has been filled, the doors will be locked. We will take attendance for each Mass and/or Liturgical service for contact tracing purposes.

The Feast of Divine Mercy, celebrated on the Octave of Easter (the Sunday after Easter Sunday), is a relatively new addition to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar. Celebrating the Divine Mercy of Jesus Christ, as revealed by Christ Himself to Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, this feast was extended to the entire Catholic Church by Pope John Paul II on April 30, 2000, the day that he canonized Saint Faustina.

Divine Mercy Sunday, April 11th: Our Lord said to Saint Faustina: Encourage souls to say the Chaplet which I have given to you. Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death.... When they say this chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as the just judge but as the Merciful Saviour. Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy. I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in My mercy... Through the Chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will.
